## **Winslow Homer**

Born in 1836, Winslow Homer is regarded by many as one of the greatest American painters of the 19th century.

- Established watercolor as an important medium in America
- Frequently inspired by nature, particularly marine life; often carried painting materials with him
- Adapted his color palette to the environmental conditions

around him





## His watercolor techniques:

- Layered thin washes of color, light to dark
- Luminous and transparent white of the paper
- Negative painting: Paint around the white areas, i.e. clouds
- Subtractive painting: Removing/absorbing paint from the surface in a controlled way
  - e.g. Toilet paper, paper towels, sponge, rags, etc.




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
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


  - OverlappingLocation/placement on page

- Atmospheric perspective > Color intensity: lighter layers in the back
  - > Contrast: less contrast/detail in the back
